In Ephesians 6, St. Paul urges us, "Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil." It's a section of the Scriptures that is beautiful but rather vague. What exactly is Paul telling us to do in these words? When he urges us to put on "the belt of truth" and "the breastplate of righteousness," what is he asking of us?

The answers depend largely on our context. All Christians will have to endure some form of spiritual warfare. All Christians will endure the attacks of the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh in this life. But how those attacks manifest themselves changes from individual to individual, generation to generation, and culture to culture. This is why we should always be mindful about clinging to our faith in an ever changing world.

With that in mind, my newsletter series for the next few months will focus on how we 21st century suburban Americans should prepare to endure the attacks of Satan. In particular, I'll be addressing ways we can better position ourselves to face the scorn of the evil foe. This month, we'll begin with church attendance.

A pastor friend of mine once made the following observation: People generally skip church about twice as often as their parents did when they were growing up. So, for example, if your parents never skipped, you probably attend every week. If your parents went every other week, you probably attend about once a month. If your parents went once a month, you might show up 3 or 4 times a year. And if your parents went to church 3 to 4 times a year, you won't go at all.

This isn't a universal rule, of course, but in my experience, it's an overwhelmingly common trend. Why does this happen? There are surely several reasons, but one of them is that Christians have a dangerous habit of overestimating how much time we spend receiving God's gifts, just as we have a dangerous habit of underestimating how much we need them.

Think of it this way: If you attend the divine service about once a month, that doesn't sound terribly infrequent. It sounds almost regular. You won't be gone often enough for people to worry that something is wrong. You'll be hitting all the major seasons of the church year. But, at the same time, if you attend the divine service once a month, you'll only spend about 12 hours a year receiving the gifts of Christ with your fellow Christians-12 hours out of 8,760. Likewise, that's a mere 12 hours a year in a world that has become increasingly hostile to Christ and His Church, a world that seeks to devour your faith in countless ways. (CONT. on pg 2)

JESUS IS LORD!

In the last few weeks our readings in Luke's gospel have come from a section known as the "travel narrative." Here, Luke records Jesus' journey from the northern region of Israel—the area right around the Sea of Galilee—southward toward the city of Jerusalem. Jesus' reason for making the journey is clear: he is going to Jerusalem so that "everything that is written about the Son of Man by the prophets will be accomplished." (Lk. 18:31) Jesus knows what awaits him there. He knows that in Jerusalem he will be rejected, mocked, scourged, and killed. But he also knows that, on the third day, he will rise.

Jesus set his face toward Jerusalem so that he might accomplish our redemption—so that he might conquer the power of sin, death, and the devil—and free us from our bondage to their captivity. As Luther rightly notes in the Large Catechism, this is what it means to confess that **Jesus Christ is my Lord**:

"...the little word "Lord" simply means the same as Redeemer, that is, he who has brought us back from the devil to God, from death to life, from sin to righteousness, and keeps us there."

By his obedience to God's divine plan—through his dying and rising—Jesus Christ has won the right to be your Lord. This is a right that no other person can claim. Christ has no equal.

When we make this exclusive confession—when we say "Jesus is Lord!"—we inevitably offend many of those who are still held captive under the power of the devil. The world hates this confession and will often try to stop the mouths of those who speak it. That's why, as Jesus makes his way to Jerusalem, he tells us those who want to be his disciples should be prepared to take up their cross daily. You can't find eternal life by holding on to your earthly life at all costs. You can't call Jesus your Lord and have the world love you for it.

May God strengthen all of us who have been called out of darkness and into the marvelous light of Christ's kingdom so that we hold fast to the good confession that "Jesus is Lord!"

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord...

Our modern American culture is a world dedicated to seducing us into all forms of idolatry. It's a world where television programs for preschoolers seek to indoctrinate them with a perverse understanding of human identity and sexuality. It's a world where social media is designed to reward the bitter and thoughtless and to isolate the kind and the wise. Our world is one where educational systems are, in many ways, designed to make people despise the Scriptures and where political entities deliberately develop their political philosophy in opposition to Christian doctrine. Ours is a world where friends and family members will throw you out of their lives for clinging to your Savior instead of blessing their sins. It's a world that tries to sell you political saviors to replace the Savior of your body and soul, a world that wants you to believe that you can bring about social justice or return to social order by hating your neighbor. Our world is one that daily seeks to beat believers down and rip Christ from their hearts in countless ways.

On account of this, you don't have the "luxury" of attending holy worship less often than your parents, nor do you even have the "luxury" of attending as often as they did. Returning to Paul's words from Ephesians 6, putting on the armor of God in our current culture means piling on more of it and pulling the straps even tighter. It means showing up every week.

Every week, you and your children need to hear the promise of God's love to drown out the lies of a world that tempts you to hate God. Every week, you need to receive the Sacrament to strengthen yourself against the attacks of a world that despises the Savior who offers us His flesh and blood to eat and drink. Every week, you need instruction from God's word to clear your ears of this world's endless stream of lies. Every week, you need to escape those who mock you for believing in Christ by standing beside brothers and sisters in the faith who cherish your faith because they share your Savior and His salvation.

Put on the whole armor of God, not half of it. Not a quarter of it. Put it all on by joining the divine service every week.

TREASURER AND CCLS UPDATE DANIEL SCHOW

I'm not a betting man, but I'll make a wager anyway. I'll bet that everyone reading this newsletter has—or knows someone who has—looked at their finances and wondered how can they possibly afford to send their children to a Christian private school.

The answer to that question is the new Missouri program called **MOScholars**. Children who qualify are eligible to receive a \$6,375 scholarship! Plus, if a child is awarded the scholarship, it can be renewed through 12th grade and is not considered MO taxable income. Dr. Hoehner recently shared that there are several students at CCLS who have already received this scholarship.

Currently, the MOScholars program is funded by donations. Both individuals and businesses can donate to the fund. The exciting part is **you can donate up to 50% of your state tax liability** to help build the scholarship.

A CLOSER LOOK AT.... THE BOOK OF CONCORD

WHAT IS THE BOOK OF CONCORD?

The Book of Concord is actually a collection of several confessional documents. Those documents are: the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, the Athanasian Creed, the Augsburg Confession (1530), the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, Luther's Small and Large Catechisms, the Smalcald Articles, the Treatise on the Power and Primacy of the Pope, and the Formula of Concord. These collected confessions of the Lutheran church were formally published in 1580.

WHAT IS ITS PURPOSE?

The word "concord" means agreement. The purpose of the Book of Concord is to guide Lutherans in a right understanding of what the Holy Scriptures teach so that they might "agree together" and make a good confession of the faith. In this respect, the Book of Concord functions like a road map for how Lutherans read and interpret the scriptures. The Book of Concord also guides our church's public teaching. As part of their ordination vows, every LCMS pastor is required to promise that they will perform their pastoral duties in accordance with the Book of Concord because it is in agreement with the scriptures.
