And in that spirit, I'd like to share with you a few of the new things that are beginning at Prince of Peace beginning this month.

New newsletter:

As you can see, we have relaunched the congregational newsletter, thanks in large part to Vicar Doebler's layout and design talents.

While we'll still continue sending out email blasts and putting announcements in the bulletin, you'll find all the info for the upcoming congregational events here. You'll also find a few sections featuring devotional materials-namely the pastor's article and a section on Luther's Small Catechism, as well as some brief financial reports and calendars for the upcoming months.

New fellowship opportunities:

For the past two summers, we did VBS a bit differently than it's normally done. Instead of having a one week event aimed primarily at children, we featured three consecutive Wednesday evenings aimed at families. We had a meal, a lesson, and time for fellowship and fun. Those who attended found these events to be a great way for us to grow in the faith and to grow in familiarity with each other.

In that spirit, we've decided to start offering once a month fellowship evenings. On the **second Wednesday evening of each month** (excluding Advent and Lent), we'll have a potluck, a brief devotion, and some time for a variety of fun activities.

FOLLY & WISDOM

VICAR MATT DOEBLER

A few weeks ago, we heard the parable of the rich fool-a warning against putting hope in our own resourcefulness. The rich fool is deceived by his abundance. He convinces himself that his life is self-sustaining and not a gift on loan from God. He forgets that he is a mere creature. He proceeds to act as if he is his own Creator—capable of speaking his future into existence:

And I will say to my soul, "Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry." (Luke 12:19)

Yet, God's verdict on the matter is that those who think and act this way are fools. **What does this mean?** The scriptures (especially the wisdom books of Psalms, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes) give us a comprehensive picture of what makes one a fool in God's eyes. A fool rejects God's authority (Ps. 14:1), mocks God's righteous law (Pro. 10:23), believes he is accountable only to himself (Pro. 12:15), despises those who correct him (Pro. 15:5), and keeps repeating the same self-destructive patterns (Pro. 26:11).

Sound familiar? We don't have to look far to find ample evidence of foolish attitudes and behaviors. In fact, we often need only to look in the mirror.

The antidote for foolish thinking is wisdom. Wisdom begins with the recognition that God is the creator of everything—which means that we are His creatures: dependent, accountable, and existing only because of God's "fatherly, divine goodness and mercy" apart from any merit or worthiness of our own. This is what we confess in the first article of the creed.

This month, take some time to meditate on these four central truths that the first article teaches us: 1) We are God's creatures—he owes us nothing, 2) It is our duty to thank God for his gracious provision of our creaturely needs, 3) We should confess our failure to acknowledge God's gracious care 4) True faith is a future hope which rests in God's promises.

I believe in God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

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New daily Matins services:

Beginning on September 6, Vicar Doebler and I will begin offering daily Matins services. The services will take place **every Monday through Friday at 9 am**. The hymns and liturgy will be sung acapella. We won't have a sermon each day, but we'll have a brief devotional reflection on the text.

9 am is not an ideal time, of course, as many people will just be beginning their work day at that point. Unfortunately, with our children's school schedules, that is the earliest we could offer it. However, even if nobody else or very few people attend, we still plan to continue offering the services.

Nevertheless, for all those who are able to attend, it would be great to have you with us. We all could use more prayer, more scripture, and more hymns in our lives, so Vicar Doebler and I are excited about the opportunity to offer that to you.

A CLOSER LOOK AT....MATINS


WHAT IS MATINS?

Matins is a service of devotional contemplation, prayer and praise that is in keeping with St. Paul's admonition to "pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:17).

The term "matins" comes from the Latin phrase for "of the morning." The theme of Matins is preparation and watchfulness. We are beginning the day in anticipation of our Lord's return and responding in patient hope to his promise that He will make "all things new" (Rev. 19:5).

One of the highlights of the Matins service is the canticle "Te Deum Laudamus" (We praise You, O God!) Drawing upon imagery from Revelation 4-6, the Te Deum imagines the entire Holy Christian Church gathered together in heaven's throne room along with the prophets and apostles and martyrs-lifting up a hymn of praise to the Triune God who has redeemed them.
