PUTTING ON THE ARMOR OF GOD TODAY, PART 3: CATECHESIS

In Ephesians 6, St. Paul urges us, "Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil." It's a section of the Scriptures that is beautiful but rather vague. What exactly is Paul telling us to do in these words? When he urges us to put on "the belt of truth" and "the breastplate of righteousness," what is he asking of us in our daily lives?

Last month, we focused on the subject of stewardship. This month, we'll focus on the catechetical life of the congregation.

American Lutheranism has a bad habit of treating confirmation like graduation. We put kids in two years of classes, they learn the core doctrines of the Christian faith, they memorize Luther's Small Catechism, and then, after the ceremony, they never sit down for formal instruction again. Just as those who have graduated high school never refresh their mathematical knowledge by going back to retake Algebra II, most Lutherans never go through instruction in the catechism after making their confirmation vows.

This was never a good way to approach catechesis, the art of learning the catechism and thus the Christian faith. Theology is certainly one of those subjects where our knowledge tends to erode the less we use it. You may perhaps know people who grew up Lutheran but eventually were rebaptized in a non-denominational church, in large part because they knew that Lutherans baptized infants but didn't remember why, which made them easy targets for those who teach falsely on the matter.

Likewise, our contemporary world makes this approach to catechesis even more foolish. In addition to this, technology, our increasingly anti-Christian culture, and the non-stop stream of information given to us by the internet have created an environment where new issues seem to arise each day. What does the Bible say about surrogate parenthood or artificial wombs? About transgenderism? About digital consciousness? If you took youth confirmation or adult instruction classes ten years ago, it's likely that these topics didn't even come up because they weren't on anyone's radar. But they're on our radar now, just as new questions and issues will be tomorrow. If we want to live our lives faithfully, it's imperative that we put ourselves in situations where we can talk through these issues, ask questions, and investigate the Scriptures. (CONT. on pg 2)

IN THE FULLNESS OF TIME

It's quite amazing when you pause to consider it that the name of a relatively unpopular, unaccomplished, and short-lived Roman provincial governor has made its way into our Christian creeds. Pilate, like so many other historical figures of comparable ilk, should have long been forgotten. The memory of his name consigned to the ash heap of history. Yet, for nearly two millennia, Christians around the globe and in every generation have been recalling the name of Pontius Pilate—the cowardly and calculating Roman ruler who presided over the suffering, death, and burial of our Lord.

Why? What motivated Christians of long ago to preserve the memory of this otherwise unremarkable individual within a creedal confession that summarizes the very heart of their faith?

Well, human history is at the heart of the Christian confession. It's the story that God became a man and stepped into human history in order to redeem it. That's certainly what we celebrate during the seasons of Advent and Christmas. Jesus Christ—born of the Virgin Mary. But the story of God's involvement in human history doesn't let us linger long at the manger—it drives us onward. It compels us to bear witness to dark moments of temptation, astonishing miracles, confessions of faith, jealous accusations, unjust suffering, violent death, and glorious resurrection. History unfolds. Everything happens in a certain place. At a certain time. Jesus suffered under Pontius Pilate. It's not a myth or a legend. It's history. One day it happened. And it happened for you.

Christianity is not a philosophy. The essence of Christianity is not a principle or an idea, but a reality. It's about what God really said and did in order to accomplish your salvation. The creed helps us to remember that remarkable truth by not allowing our faith to drift like some timeless tale, but by anchoring it unapologetically to human history.

But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons. (Gal. 4:4-5)

Because of this, another way we can put on the armor of God is by repeatedly availing ourselves of the church's catechetical life. Come to Bible class. Ask questions, even if they're not on subject. Come to the adult instruction class every couple years. (I'll be offering one after the new year.) You can be certain that there will always be more material to learn and more confusing muck to walk through and wash off through the word.

Don't be afraid or ashamed when you can't remember what you've learned before or when you don't know how to navigate the new issues that weren't covered in your previous bits of instruction. Your job as a Christian isn't to have perfect recall or perfect foresight. Your job is to listen and learn, to go back to the well of God's word again and again. Your job is to ask God to fill you with His wisdom every time this world has filled you with confusion and fear.

Catechesis, learning the faith, is not something we graduate from. It's a lifelong discipline, and a lifelong blessing, for the Christian. Put on the armor of God by availing yourself of this blessing often.

It is an important one in that we will elect officers, board chairs and elders for 2023–2024. A CLOSER LOOK AT.... THE SEASON OF ADVENT

The four-week season of Advent has a rich history in the worship life of the Church--its observance dating back at least a thousand years but very likely even further back to the 5th or 6th century. As with Lent, Advent is historically a time of repentance and preparation--as we focus our hearts and minds on both the first and second advents (comings) of Christ. In addition, Advent marks the new beginning of the church year.

Historically, the color for the Advent season was purple, but it gradually began to be distinguished by the use of the color blue.

When we see the color blue we are reminded to look to the skies in hopeful expectation for the return of Christ.

Did you know?....The use of an advent wreath to mark the season is relatively recent to the Church's practice. Nonetheless, advent wreaths help us in several ways to remember the themes of advent. The circular shape of the wreath reminds us of the eternal life that Christ gives to us. The lighting of its candles reminds us that the Light of God has come in Christ and will come again. Some advent wreaths feature a rose-colored candle which signifies the third week of Advent (traditionally called Gaudete--Latin for "rejoice.") If you listen for it, on the third Sunday of Advent the introit will always begin with the word "rejoice."
